UN Tourism Presents: Tourism Education Guidelines

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Summary

Luis Nicolas Barrios emphasized the recovery surpassing pre-pandemic levels in some regions, underscoring people's innate desire to travel. However, this swift recovery has spotlighted challenges, notably staff shortages within the tourism sector, prompting the need for enhanced tourism education to meet industry demands. UN Tourism's primary goal is to foster education, a consistent message reiterated by the Secretary General in his addresses.

Barrios outlined seven key guidelines for tourism education: increasing access through digitalization, upgrading curricula to incorporate evolving technologies like AI, integrating tourism education into secondary schools, innovating undergraduate and graduate programs, standardizing certifications, expanding quality assurance, and connecting graduates with job opportunities. He stressed the importance of making education accessible, citing the UN Tourism Online Academy's success with over 40,000 students and multiple language offerings supported by AI tutors. Additionally, the promotion of WhatsApp courses aims to further ease access to education.

Several initiatives are underway to localize tourism education, including the launch of international tourism academies in collaboration with member states. Examples include the Academy of Samarkand and upcoming partnerships with Zambia, Zimbabwe, and the Dominican Republic, focusing on vocational training. The need for continuous curriculum updates was illustrated through examples from Hong Kong Politek and Columbia College, integrating digital tools and event management skills respectively. Standardized certifications and quality assurance were highlighted as crucial for maintaining educational standards. Lastly, connecting graduates with employment opportunities remains a challenge, though successful examples exist, such as Chile's efforts in the gastronomy sector.
